Course Description: This course is designed to introduce students to the concepts of therapeutic interactions, facilitating a positive work environment through effective communication and understanding various roles in the team process.

Goals: Upon completion of this course students will develop an understanding of:

- 1. How to apply various types of communication to foster specific therapeutic relationships
- 2. The importance of ethics and integrity in the professional setting
- 3. Identification and practice in the team process

Students will be introduced to important concepts such as interactive skills, team dynamics and communication styles.

Outcomes: Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate competency with establishing therapeutic rapport
- 2. Identify their own personal communication style
- 3. Articulate and apply the concepts of ethics and integrity
- 4. Identify stages in the group process
- 5. Apply the concepts of team approaches
- 6. Demonstrate effective written communication
- 7. Use appropriate technology and information to conduct research

Methodology: Learning experiences to be used in this class include on-line course material, unit assignments, reading assignments from textbook, problem solving activities, and exams.
