Course Description: Basic principles of range management as they apply and relate to livestock production, conservation practices and wildlife management, region vegetative types and range sites, and grazing systems and multiple range uses. Several field trips will be included.

Statement of Prerequisites: None

Goal: To provide the student an in-depth study of the rangelands of the West. Focus will be on range plants and their relationship with livestock, wildlife, humans and weather.

Outcomes:

At the completion of this course, students should be:

- 1. Informed of the ecological processes of plants and how interaction with animals affects that.
- 2. Able to identify grasses, forbs, shrubs and noxious weeds found in range situations.
- 3. Capable of identifying management methods of rangelands and livestock to improve the wellbeing of both.
- 4. Recognize and understand many of the current issues surrounding rangeland ecology.

Methodology: This course is designed as a lecture type course; however, many different methods of instruction will be used, including "hands-on" field trips, slides, guest lectures, and plant mount study. Labs sessions will be used to explore range topics in and around the community as well as the in-depth study of plants and noxious weeds.

Evaluation Criteria:

Grades in this course will be based on the following criteria:

- 1. Attendance is essential and will be recorded. Announced and unannounced quizzes will be given for both lab and class time. There will be a lab assignment or quiz each week and excused absences require prior approval. Assignments or quizzes missed for unexcused absences may only be made up for a lower grade.
- 2. The remainder of the grade will consist of several tests, including a possible mid-term and possible comprehensive final, quizzes, papers and reports.
- 3. Class participation.

4. Lab: Each lab will be given a grade of 20 pts creating a final lab grade equal to a test. These points cannot be made up Please contact me if a school related function interferes with any lab. A final lab project using the information collected from the labs throughout the semester will be due the last week of class. It is imperative you keep a notebook of all lab information handed out and recorded from every lab section.
