Course Description:

This course provides both a theoretical and real-life view, for both genders, on how our communication in work, school, social, and relationship settings help shape and design our gender constructs.

Statement of Prerequisites: None.

Goal: To introduce students to the skills and concepts of Gender Communication that will promote critical thinking and help students improve their understanding of the development of gender identity, and how the genders are impacted by all facets of society.

GENERAL EDUCATION OUTCOMES (GEO)

1. Demonstrate effective oral and written communication

a. Students will identify, understand, and apply communication theory to various interpersonal situations dealing with gender, demonstrating understanding orally and in written assignments.

2. Solve problems using critical thinking and creativity

a. Students will be introduced to thinking critically and ethically about the various communication elements that influence gender and relationships.

- b. Students will analyze the effects on gender development that specific communication behaviors and strategies have in a variety of relationships and situations.
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of diverse cultures and historical perspectives
 - a. Students will demonstrate an understanding of how to communicate appropriately and ethically in interpersonal situations, demonstrating a heightened awareness of diversity.
- 4. Appreciate aesthetic and creative activities
 - a. Students will be able to demonstrate an appreciation for their world and their place in it through the communication about self, others, gender, and the world in which they exist.
 - b. Students will examine and analyze nonverbal communication and gender as illustrated in various aesthetic and creative activities.
- 5. Describe the value of personal, civic, and social responsibilities
 - a. Students will be able to demonstrate and describe the value of personal, civic, and social responsibilities by illustrating their awareness of gender through appropriate use of perception-checking, empathy, active listening, "I-language" and "we language".
 - b. Students will recognize the dynamic nature of relationships in regards to ethics, power, and conflict.

COURSE OUTCOMES (DEPARTMENT SPECIFIC) (CO):

Upon the successful completion of Gender Communication, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify various elements of the creation of gender identity and how these elements contribute to the creation of shared meaning.
- 2. Identify their own communication goals through the eyes of their gender, and how their perceptions, emotions, and expectations influence their self-disclosure to others.
- 3. Demonstrate awareness of gender through the appropriate use of perception-checking, empathy, active listening, "I-language" and "we-language".
- 4. Utilize nonverbal communication codes to construct and interpret gendered messages.
- 5. Recognize the dynamic nature of relationships, and genders impact on them, in regards to power, conflict, and context.
- 6. Comprehend the impact of culture, society, technology, family, friends, and romantic partners on the creation and transaction of gendered messages.

Methodology: Lecture

Evaluation Criteria: Students will be evaluated based on their ability to properly demonstrate understanding of the core concepts of Gender Communication through both written and oral assignments. Students will be asked to recognize Gender Communication principles through film and television. Students will also take a final exam that will have both written and oral aspects.
