**Course Description:** This course covers briefing, legal analysis, IRACs and synthesizing skills. Students will brief, draft IRACs and synthesize cases on substantive law issues.

**Statement of Prerequisites:** LEGL 1610, Paralegalism I is a prerequisite for this class or may be taken concurrently with Paralegalism I. I encourage students to take these classes concurrently.

**Goals:** At the end of the semester, students will be able to brief cases, IRAC and synthesize a series of cases.

**Computer Competencies Requirement:** Students must complete 3 hours of the current Word program. If students take it through the Flexlab, they must take the first modual during their first semester. Students may also take all three (3) hours online.

**Outcomes:** Students will be given rubrics and samples for all assignments. Students should have an 80% average on briefs, IRACs, the syntheses project and other assignments.

### **General Education Outcomes:**

- 1. Demonstrate effective oral and written communication. Students will:
  - Interview graduates in a social setting, a lunch and turn in 10 items that the student learned about the graduate and the profession.

- Brief and present cases orally and in a written format. I will provide a rubric and all briefs will be graded.
- Orally present key facts from a historical case.
- Write a compare and contrast paper on <u>Mendez v. Westmister</u> and <u>Brown v.</u> Board of Education.
- 3. Solve problems using critical thinking and creativity.
  - Students will interview clients in Casper College Legal Services and draft work product under the supervision of an attorney.
  - Students will draft multiple IRACs. This means apply a clients facts to a case or statute and state why the case does or does not apply and state whether their court should or should not follow the case or statute.
  - Students will draft a synthesis paper applying three cases to a client's facts.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of diverse cultures and historical perspectives.
  - Students will write a compare and contract of Mendez v. Westmister and Brown v. Board of Education. Students include an analysis of academic articles and a speaker from the program who was the only African American student in the 1960s in her southern public school post Brown.
  - After reading <u>The Buffalo Creek Disaster</u> and watching the DVD on the disaster students identify the key facts in the lawsuit.
  - After watching To Kill a Mockingbord students will identify key facts.
  - After reading a historical case students will identify the key facts.
  - After briefing Supreme Court privacy cases and watching If the Walls Could Talk Part I, students draft an IRAC on abortion and sodomy issues.
- 6. Use appropriate technology and information to conduct research.
  - Students will complete exercises from the Goldman Technology text and online classroom on the role between ethics and technology.
- 7. Describe the value of personal, civic and social responsibilities.
  - Students will interview clients in Casper College Legal Services and draft work product under the supervision of an attorney.

**Methodology:** Students will meet these outcomes by briefing cases, drafting IRACS, synthesizing a series of cases, completing exercises to master legal analysis and drafting a closed interoffice memo.

**Reading Assignments:** All assignments on the syllabus are required reading.

**Required Texts:** <u>Legal Analysis and Writing for Paralegals</u>, Fourth Edition by William H. Putman, assigned Ethics cases, <u>Ethics</u>, <u>Top Ten Rules for Paralegals</u>, Second Edition by Deborah K. Orlick, modified Technology Text and Online Classroom by Thomas F. Goldman.

You will use these books throughout the program. Do not rent books because they time out.

Note: There may be repetitive assignments from Orlick and Goldman. This is because not every student takes these courses in the same order. If you save your work, you may hand it in a second time.

Suggested Resource: Pocket Guide to Legal Writing by William H. Putman

**Preparation:** You should come to class prepared to discuss the assigned reading material. Everyone in class will have a better experience if you come to class ready to participate in the class discussion. You may not make up participation points

**In class:** While you are in class, this means from the top of the hour until the break or the end of class, online and similar activities such as texting, Facebook interactions, YouTube viewing, etc. are strictly forbidden.
