Catalog Description and General Objectives:

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

A survey course designed for reading and discussion of works of literature for children. Selection of children's books for school, home, and library is stressed. In order to establish criteria for evaluation, students are expected to become acquainted with a wide sampling of children's literature including classics, both old and new.

Prerequisite: ENGL 1020

COURSE GOAL AND OUTCOMES:

Goal: Students are expected to develop skills which will help them to evaluate children's books and to select appropriate material for children.

Objectives. Students are expected to:

- Become familiar with the wealth and variety of literature available for children.
- Become familiar with the criteria for determining good literature for children at each educational level.
- Identify the various genres of literature for children and be able to classify books according to genre.
- Gain insights into child development and reading preferences.
- Develop an awareness of currents trends and issues in children's literature.
- Become aware of the resources available to teachers that will help them to select and use good literature for children and encourage teachers to integrate children's literature across the curricula.

METHODOLOGY:

Classes will consist of lecture by the instructor, whole class and small group discussions, hands-on investigation of children's literature books, library visits, and student projects and presentations.

EVALUATION CRITERIA:

Evaluation Criteria: All student work will be evaluated holistically, with attention given to correct grammatical form, spelling, and oral and written presentation and expression, as well as knowledge of material.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

In addition to reading and discussing the five required children's texts, each student will be required to complete the following:

(Full criteria for each project will be presented in class)

<u>Summary Evaluations:</u> (30) read and to evaluate 30 children's books from specific genres and categories.

<u>Book Shares:</u> Bring ten (10) children's texts to class that correlate with the designated genre topic to share and use in activities.

<u>Issue Paper and Presentation:</u> Write one (1) paper addressing an issue concerning children for presentation in class.

<u>Author/Illustrator Study and Presentation:</u> Create one (1) Power Point presenting the life and works of a selected author for presentation to class.

Final Project: Choose one (1)

- 1. Be an Author: Write an original children's picture book
- 2. Thematic Lesson: Create a thematic "mini" unit based upon children's literature.
- 3. Story Telling: Come in character and re-tell a children's story

Extra Credit:

Optional experiences may be used for additional credit. A MAXIMUM OF <u>30 POINTS</u> MAY BE RECEIVED THROUGH ADDITIONAL CREDIT WORK. I must approve all additional credit projects in advance. **All optional learning assignments are due by Week 15 of the course.** Any of the special projects listed above may be used for additional credit plus the following:

- Additional Summary Evaluations (10 pts. each),
- An interview with a family member or educator about their favorite childhood book/story (see me for details) (25 pts.)
- Design your own experience. Always receive prior approval and request guidelines.

<u>eFolio</u> accounts are initially paid for by Casper College (based upon continued funding). Beyond this course, continuation and maintenance of eFolio may be conducted solely between the student and eFolioWorld. Students will adhere to the user policy or will forfeit their eFolio account.
