Course Description: The organization and nature of the American national government and Wyoming state government and their constitutional development. This course meets the statutory requirement for instruction in the Constitutions of the United States and Wyoming.

Goal: To help you become more aware of your role and responsibilities in regard to our state and national government. Also, for you to be more aware of how government matters in your life.

Course Objectives/Outcomes: It is expected that completion of this course will assist each student in becoming:

- 1. more knowledgeable of the organization, bases, functions, and policies of the American and Wyoming political systems;
- 2. better able to understand political processes and their implications;
- 3. better able to understand the bases and issues associated with current events in the local, state, national, and international realms;
- 4. better able to meet the reading, writing, researching, and speaking demands essential for a college experience (this corresponds with the college's outcomes #1 "Demonstrate effective oral and written communication" and #6 "Use appropriate technology and information to conduct research");
- 5. more aware of other political philosophies and points of view;
- 6. appreciate the balance between rights and responsibilities in the American and Wyoming political systems (this correspond with the college's outcome #7 "Describe the value of personal, civic, and social responsibilities").
- * Casper College may collect samples of student work demonstrating achievement of the above outcomes. Any personally identifying information will be removed from student work.

Class Policies:

First and foremost I anticipate that you will enjoy this class! Don't believe me? I only ask that you give me a chance to prove you wrong, and that you keep an open mind regarding the activities we engage in.

Readings: All assigned readings should be completed **BEFORE** the class period at which they will be discussed. **ALL students are expected** to participate in class discussions. Unannounced quizzes will cover current course material as well as articles handed out in class. It is highly recommended that students keep up with the reading in order to do well on the quizzes.

Exams: Exams in this course MAY consist of any combination of multiple choice, true / false, short answer, and essay type questions. The **Final Exam WILL NOT** be cumulative and will only cover material from the final portion of the semester. EXAMS will cover required text material, material presented in class lectures/discussions, and other supplementary material, including hand-outs, and videos.

Attendance Policy:

STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND CLASS REGULARLY. It is your responsibility to sign the roll sheet each class meeting.

Each student is allocated 50 attendance points for the semester. Each student will receive 2 "free" absences after which each successive absence will result in a 10 point deduction from the attendance point total. Students with perfect attendance (excused absences allowed) will receive a further 20 point bonus. Exams and quizzes administered in this course will cover both required text materials and information presented in class. Students are responsible for any material missed due to an absence. Quizzes and in-class written assignments will be used to further "encourage" class attendance. No make-up of the quizzes or in-class written assignments will be allowed. There is a direct correlation between attendance and success in academic courses. We are all adults and are free to make our own decisions in regard to attending class. This policy is meant to reward you for being a good student.

Missed Exam Policy:

Make-up exams will be administered and late papers will be accepted **ONLY** in case of **EXTREME** emergency. **PRIOR ARRANGEMENTS SHOULD BE MADE IF AT ALL POSSIBLE**. Proof of the emergency will be required from the student and **the decision whether to administer a make-up exam or accept a late paper will be made by the instructor**. UNANNOUNCED QUIZZES and inclass projects will be given during the semester. **NO** MAKE-UP QUIZZES or MAKE-UP OF INCLASS WORK will be given. The student MUST be in class during the quiz in order to receive credit for the quiz. **All approved test make-ups will be given during the last week of regular classes by appointment.** It is in your best interest to be present for exams in order to avoid taking them during the final week. It is your responsibility to keep track of which exams you need to make up and to remind me before the final week of class.

*Please note: EXAMS during the semester MAY NOT be given only at the beginning of class. If the exams are given at the beginning of class, any student arriving late WILL NOT be allowed any extra time to complete the exam. All students will be expected to complete the exam in the allotted time.
