Course Description: The organization and nature of the American national government and Wyoming state government and their constitutional development. This course meets the statutory requirement for instruction in the Constitutions of the United States and Wyoming.

Statement of Prerequisites: There are no prerequisites for this course; however, college level reading and writing abilities are presumed. Students with an ACT English score below 20 or a Compass English or Reading exam score below 75 may want to complete the Basic Writing II (ENGL 0610) *before* taking this course. If you have taken or are currently taking Freshman English, this course is fine for you to take at this time.

Goal: This course is designed to satisfy the 1925 Wyoming statutory requirement for studying the U.S. and Wyoming constitutions. In addition we will critically examine the various institutions and groups that constitute our political system. It is hoped from this study you will better understand how and why our government functions as it does and be able, if you choose, to make more informed decisions.

Outcomes: It is expected that completion of this course will assist each student in becoming:

- 1. more knowledgeable of the historic and constitutional bases, organization, functions, and policies of the American and Wyoming political systems;
- 2. better able to understand political affairs and their implications;
- 3. better able to understand the bases and issues associated with current events, especially political, in the local, state, national, and international realms;
- 4. better able to meet the reading, writing, researching, and speaking demands essential for a college experience (this corresponds with the college's outcomes #1 "Demonstrate effective oral and written communication" and #6 "Use appropriate technology and information to conduct research");
- 5. better able to identify the differences between major political philosophies and points of view;

6. more knowledgeable of what it means to be a responsible citizen in a democratic system (this corresponds with the college's outcome #7 "Describe the value of personal, civic, and social responsibilities").

*Casper College may collect samples of student work demonstrating achievement of the above college outcomes. Any personal identifying information will be removed from student work.

Methodology: Textbook readings and online threaded discussions. The Threaded Discussions will start on Mondays and end on Saturdays. Choose the days of week that work best for your schedule. You must complete the requirements for participation on or before Saturday as noted on the Syllabus Schedule. Students are expected to read all assignments, take notes on your readings, to think, and to critically discuss the topics of this course. A variety of perspectives and opinions will be presented and encouraged. Be willing to take some intellectual chances. We will work together to explore our political system.

<u>Hints for success on the exams</u> FOR EACH EXAM: READ THE ENTIRE CHAPTERS FOR THAT EXAM, SET ASIDE THE DESIGNATED TIME TO COMPLETE THE EXAM, FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS. USE YOUR TEXTBOOK AND NOTES DURING THE EXAM (you will NOT

have enough time to just do the exam from the book and notes without first having read, highlighted, and studied the material).

EVEN AFTER ALL OF MY WARNINGS, IF YOU CHOOSE TO ASSIST ANYONE WITH THE EXAMS IN ANY WAY - YOU AND THE OTHER PERSON(S) WILL FAIL THIS COURSE!

WYOMING RESEARCH PROJECT. YOU ARE REQUIRED TO COMPLETE THIS PROJECT. You will complete a Wyoming Research Sheet by reading the "Equality State" textbook and conducting research using outside resources (i.e. Internet – State of Wyoming Web sites will be useful) (worth 100 points). Follow the directions on the Research Sheet. You are expected to write full paragraph responses for the questions AND conduct outside research for each question. See Course Syllabus for due date.

THREADED DISCUSSIONS: You are **REQUIRED** to participate in a series of 14 Chapter Threaded Discussions. I expect that you will contribute to the discussions, use them to help clarify occasional fuzzy ideas and to gain an understanding of the concepts. Each discussion will begin with a question(s) posed to the class (by me). Refer to the Threaded Discussion Grading Rubric for more information on earning points. THESE ARE TO COMPLETED BY THE DUE DATE.

YOU MUST RESPOND BY INITIALLY BY THURSDAY TO THE QUESTION(S). FURTHERMORE, YOU MUST THEN DISCUSS THE QUESTIONS/ISSUES BEFORE SATURDAY OF THAT SAME WEEK.

Please respond and discuss with your class colleagues. The grading criteria are listed on the course website under the Grading Rubric. Each discussion is worth 10 points totaling 140 points for the semester. You are expected to write full paragraph responses for the questions.

Please adhere to the following guidelines as you participate in the threaded discussions:

- 1) Plan for each threaded discussion to continue for the entire time assigned to that chapter.
- 2) Participants' comments and questions should be *thoughtful* and *concise*. It is important to take the time to post messages that reflect critical thinking skills and that are carefully written. Although you may need to elaborate from time to time on specific issues, try not to do that as a general rule. Others in the class will appreciate your efforts to be succinct.
- 3) Please take extra care to be considerate of each other. This is especially important in threaded discussions because emotions are difficult to communicate. Sometimes even carefully worded critiques, meant in a supportive and positive way, lead to misunderstandings and/or hurt feelings.
- 4) In order to get credit for a threaded discussion, you MUST RESPOND TO THE QUESTION BEFORE OR ON THURSDAY OF EACH WEEK AND ALSO RESPOND TO AT LEAST TWO OTHER POSTINGS BEFORE OR ON SATURDAY OF THAT WEEK in the discussion in a meaningful way. YOU WILL BE GRADED AT THE END OF EACH CHAPTER FOR YOUR

THREADED DISCUSSION PARTICIPATION BASED ON THE COURSE THREADED DISCUSSION RUBRIC (this is posted on the class site).

IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO monitor the discussions frequently and post your comments and questions to one another as often as you desire. This is your only guided opportunity for interaction with the other students in the class and I am confident that these discussions will enhance your learning substantially. I highly value the benefit of discussing these ideas, especially for those of you who are experiencing them for the first time. During the semester, I will contact you only if I feel you are in need of improvement. And finally, during the last week, I will ask you to evaluate your overall participation in the course with an email to me that lists your exam grades and a paragraph summarizing your participation during the semester.

- 5) I will monitor the discussions for accuracy. I am interested in your conceptual understanding and this is one of the ways in which I can assess and support your learning.
- 6) The discussion threads will remain available for you to read but will not be active after the assigned week. If you have a question relating to an earlier discussion, you might want to use more conventional email instead.

EACH STUDENT IS REQUIRED TO MEET WITH ME AT MID-SEMESTER TO DISCUSS YOUR PROGRESS IN THE COURSE AND TO REVIEW THE WYOMING STUDY SHEET PROJECT. THIS WILL TAKE APPROXIMATELY 10 MINUTES AND WILL BE CONDUCTED VIA PHONE.
