Course Description:

This course examines the organization and nature of the American national government and Wyoming state government and their constitutional development. This course meets the statutory requirement for instruction in the Constitutions of the United States and Wyoming.

Statement of Prerequisites: None.

Specific Objectives (Outcomes): It is expected that completion of this course will assist each student in becoming:

- 1. more knowledgeable of the historic and constitutional bases, organization, functions, and policies of the American and Wyoming political systems;
- 2. better able to understand political affairs and their implications;
- 3. better able to understand the bases and issues associated with current events, especially political, in the local, state, national, and international realms;
- 4. better able to meet the reading, writing, researching, and speaking demands essential for a college experience (this corresponds with the college's outcomes #1 "Demonstrate effective oral and written communication" and #6 "Use appropriate technology and information to conduct research");
- 5. better able to identify the differences between major political philosophies and points of view; and
- 6. more knowledgeable of what it means to be a responsible citizen in a democratic system (this corresponds with the college's outcome #7 "Describe the value of personal, civic, and social responsibilities").

*Casper College may collect samples of student work demonstrating achievement of the above college outcomes. Any personal identifying information will be removed from student work.

Methodology:

Course content will be delivered via readings, online lectures, videos, and discussions.

Required Text, Readings, and Materials:

<u>Required Textbook</u>: Janda, Berry, and Goldman, Schildkraut, <u>The Challenge of Democracy</u>. 13th edition. Boston: Wadsworth, 2016.

<u>Recommended Readings</u>: Making sense of American government and politics is impossible unless you stay abreast of current events. I strongly encourage you to read the local paper (<u>www.trib.com</u>) AND a good national newspaper every day. Two excellent sources of current political news include: <u>www.newyorktimes.com</u> and <u>www.washingtonpost.com</u>

Weaving "real-world" examples into your discussion posts for this course will make your arguments more compelling and the class discussion more interesting.

Evaluation Criteria:

1. 300 points. **Examinations**. Two exams: one midterm and one final (150 points each) will be completed in accordance with the course calendar. Exams will be closed-book, timed (60 minute) proctored examinations. No late exams will be accepted.

Students based in Casper must complete their exams at Casper College's Academic Testing Center. Students are responsible for scheduling exams (go to http://www.caspercollege.edu/testing/).

Students based outside of Casper must locate an *approved* testing center in their vicinity (go to http://www.ncta-testing.org/cctc/find.php) and schedule an appointment in accordance with the course calendar. Students are responsible for any fees and charges associated with testing at a remote center.

- 2. 50 points. **Personal Statement.** Students must submit a personal statement in accordance with the course schedule. The personal statement will set forth personal and professional goals for students' time at Casper College and in the workplace. Additional details will be posted in Moodle.
- 3. 50 points. **Student-Instructor Conferences.** Two student-instructor conferences (each worth 25 points) will be scheduled during the semester in accordance with the course schedule. Conferences will be via skype or phone and serve as a progress report and an opportunity to meet and discuss matters in a one-on-one setting.

- 4. 100 points. **Research and Writing Assignment.** A short paper (four to five pages in length) will be assigned during the semester. Students will be assessed on their ability to use appropriate technology and materials to conduct research. Further, students will be assessed on their ability to effectively communicate their findings. Specific details will be distributed in Moodle.
- 5. 150 points. **Online Chapter Quizzes.** Students must complete 15 open-book quizzes (worth 10 points each) using the *Challenge of Democracy* textbook or online research materials. Quizzes will be completed in Moodle. No late quizzes will be accepted.
- 6. 150 points. **Discussion Posts**. An important part of the class will be the online discussion of the materials we are reading and learning about. One of the chief complaints about distance learning is that it fails to capture the intellectual give-and-take of the classroom. Our discussion forum is designed to address that shortcoming.

We will use our weekly forum discussion to tackle some of the most provocative questions now facing our government and our society. The discussion forums (15 in total) will be posted weekly, and must be completed in accordance with the course calendar. No late submissions will be accepted.
